# Next Steps on God's Path: Congregational Vitality/Mission

We're maintaining, yet with some concerns. That's the quick summary of our Congregational Vitality survey results. My thanks to the 46 people of our congregation who took time to offer their perceptions of the following 14 congregational ministry areas, using a scale that went from (1), meaning "Hardly at All or Poorly," to (5), meaning "Very Well or Great":

- Worship nurtures faith (4.1)
- Helps deepen relationship with God (4.2)
- Clear sense of mission (4.0)
- Excitement about the future (3.4)
- Always ready to try new things (3.6)
- A positive force in the community (4.3)
- Incorporate newcomers (3.7)
- Seek out and use gifts of all ages (3.7)
- Build strong, healthy relationships (3.6)
- Manage disagreements in healthy, respectful ways (3.5)
- Help those in need (4.5)
- Equip people to share their faith with others (3.8)
- Interact with the local community (4.2)
  - Help people live out faith in daily life (4.0)

How did you respond? How would you respond? Thank you for your perspective.

As of this writing, those willing and able have met twice with our Assistant to the Bishop Pastor Katherine Finegan. (These gatherings are open to everyone!) She so far has led us in considering these survey results and beginning next steps, including the qualities of a "maintenance" vs. "mission" congregation. For example:

 When contemplating some form of change, the maintenance congregation says, "If this proves upsetting to any of our members, we won't do it", but the mission congregation says, "If this will help us reach someone on the outside, we will take the risk and do it." When thinking about change, the majority of members in a maintenance congregation ask, "How will this affect me?" The majority of members in the mission congregation ask, "Will this increase our ability to reach those outside?"



When thinking of its vision for ministry,

the maintenance congregation says, "We have to be faithful to our past." The mission congregation says, "We have to be faithful to our future."

- The pastor in the maintenance congregation says, "I'd like to introduce you to some of our members." In the mission congregation the members say, "We'd like to introduce you to our pastor."
- When confronted with a legitimate pastoral concern, the pastor in the maintenance congregation asks, "How can I meet this need?" The pastor in a mission congregation asks, "How can this need be met?"
- The maintenance congregation seeks to avoid conflict at any cost (but rarely succeeds). The mission congregation understands that conflict is the price of progress, and is willing to pay the price. It understands that it cannot take everyone with it. This causes some grief, but it does not keep it from doing what needs to be done.
- The maintenance congregation thinks about how to save their congregation. The mission congregation thinks about how to reach the world.

As you read this, the next meeting with Pastor Finegan, dealing with congregational asset mapping, will probably have already taken place on June 28 at 6:30 pm. There will probably yet be another, though, and I encourage you to participate, including through your prayers. Together we are Immanuel, God with us, renewing lives in Christ Jesus through the Holy Spirit.

# **ELCA Churchwide Assembly**

The ELCA Churchwide Assembly, the primary decisionmaking body of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, will meet in New Orleans, Louisiana, August 8-13, 2016, to discuss and make decisions about how to go about God's work as a church.

This year the assembly will observe the 500th anniversary of the Reformation under the theme "Freed and Renewed in Christ" and the accompanying tagline "500 vears of God's Grace in Action."

Anna Solberg will be there as one of the voting members of the assembly elected from our Northern Great Lakes Synod. Pastors Steve & Marcia will also be in New Orleans during that week, vacationing nearby but not participating in the assembly itself.

arcclinic of Marquette (CCM), whose mission is

to give emotional, spiritual, and material assistance to any woman facing an unexpected pregnancy. CCM is there for women who decide to parent, abort, or place their baby in adoption, as well as women who have a negative pregnancy test and are at risk for a future unexpected pregnancy. CCM always offers its services at no charge, also offering new and used baby clothing, maternity clothing, and other items at no cost. CCM uses an "Earn While You Learn" program so that clients can earn needed items by attending educational sessions. In 2015 CCM had 1,069 client visits, with approximately 85 volunteers giving of their time and talents and a paid staff that includes an Executive Director, Development Director, Nurse Manager, Support Services Coordinator, and Office Manager.

In <u>August</u>, we focus on ELCA Disaster Response (LDR), bringing God's hope, healing and renewal to people whose lives have been disrupted by disasters in the United States and around

the world. When the dust settles and the headlines change, LDR stays to provide ongoing assistance to those in need.

As of this writing, the latest U.S. disaster is flooding that has displaced more than 1,000 people. And from a global perspective, the world's largest humanitarian crisis since WWII is happening right now. In 2015:

- •125 million people were in need of humanitarian assistance
- •60 million people were forced from their homes
- •37 countries were affected
- •\$20 billion dollars were needed

These statistics continue to ring true. Every day, more than 100 million people affected by natural and manmade disasters face impossible choices.

# Pastor John, A Final Note from India & Tanzania

Greetings to my sponsoring churches! This will be my final letter to you as your missionary, but I hope that you'll soon have another missionary/missionary family writing you. I have completed my "Farewell Tour" to the hospitals

we are partnering with in Tanzania, Liberia, India. My colleague Mike went with me to Liberia, having visited India and Tanzania earlier. We have gone over the needs and wishes of each institution, and I have said my goodbyes. He is ready to serve the hospitals, and I am ready to move on to whatever the Holy Spirit has in mind for me at this point in my life. She hasn't made it clear yet, but I trust She will do that soon.

John Lunn, pastor and nurse, has been international coordinator of the Lutheran Health Care Program in Tanzania and India, and we have supported his ministry as the Superior Central Conference of the Northern Great Lakes Synod, ELCA. We await a new missionary contact. I spent two weeks in Liberia where it was hot and humid – and it was also mango season. Fresh mangoes almost make the heat worth it! The road to Phebe was amazing, but to Curran, it was as bumpy as ever and I will not miss that! I will miss the pastor and people of St. Luke's Lutheran Church. The music

there is always wonderful and they gave me a very warm goodbye. Then it was time to return to India. My journey was pretty

uneventful. Security at Monrovia Airport checked our temperatures before we went into the airport and again just before we got on the plane. They have had an additional case of Ebola, hence the additional temp checks.

It was a long trip from Freetown, Sierra Leone to Accra, Ghana to Nairobi, Kenya (with a 16 hour stay in the airport) to Mumbai, India to Chennai, India and then by car to Vellore.

Since being back in Vellore, I have been saying goodbye to friends I have worked with and gotten to know in the time I spent in India. And my friends and co-workers had a service to say goodbye to me as well.

The service was amazing. Despite it being May and a time that so many are on leave (because it is the hottest time of the year), Dr. Reena had gathered a wonderful group, and they spoke about our work together and my contribution. Again, more credit than I deserve - but nice to hear.

Chitirai was there with his family – I told the story of his accident on the railroad tracks and getting his new legs. Three of our original volunteers were there. Saroja was there (my maid from the beginning), two Missionaries of Charity, Fr. Johnnie, and Sr. Victima were there. Colleagues from Radiation Therapy, former neighbors, and many friends.

It was touching and brought up so many memories! Besides Reena, I was very moved by the words from Sunil Chandy, the director of Christian Medical College. He referred to me as John the Apostle – make that apostle with a small "a". I felt very appreciated by CMC. It was a very meaningful evening. I even got the chance to preach, and I preached on healing – healing in palliative care – and miracles, large and small. At the end of the service, I was draped in garlands. The smell was wonderful! Different people from different parts of my life here placed a garland of wonderful smelling, but very hot, jasmine around my neck.

It would have been very nice to make a "Farewell Tour" of all the churches that have sponsored me over the years, but that would be very costly and time-consuming, so let me just make a promise instead: I will continue to pray for all of you. I will pray (continued next page....)

# NEWS from LOVE INC, CUP

Love In the Name of Christ Central Upper Peninsula priority for churches. A network of about

40 congregations is crossing denominational lines to help those trapped in poverty. An organization called "Love INC <u>CUP</u>" (Love, in the Name of Christ, Central Upper Peninsula) is helping them do that by providing the basics like food, clothing and a host of other essential items. "A lot of times they're needing help with making the rent, paying the electric bills. Right now, we see a lot of school supplies and clothes for kids." Right now, we are in need of a director of Love INC,.

People looking for assistance call a hotline, and operators at Love INC Boise direct them to a member church. Presently we are on hold in communicating with the hotline. But everyone is praying for a quick recovery.

#### Unifying the Body of Christ

There are more than 100 Love INC chapters across the country. While the mission of Love INC is to help churches needs in local communities, it also focuses on unifying the Body of Christ for the purpose of transforming lives. One of Jesus' prayers was that we'd be one, and there's nothing better that demonstrates the reality and the truthfulness of the Gospel than when the Church comes together and doesn't see them self in competition, Pastor Rod Enos of Southside Christian Center said, "Each church individually can't do it all. But when they work together every church brings a little bit. They each bring their part together and we can funnel that through Love INC and we can do it all."

#### **Breaking the Cycle**

Their work isn't just about meeting the physical needs of participants. As a follow up to the initial request for help, the group offers continual educational help to "break the cycle." It's a hands-on approach that requires effort on the part of those needing help. It teaches participants skills, such as healthy cooking or balancing a budget. "Just giving stuff - that handout - isn't breaking the cycle of living in need." It is investing relationally with people, walking with them -- not doing to them, not doing for them -- but doing with them the things that glorify God and brings them into first relationship with us and then by model into relationship with Christ."

#### **Beyond Church Walls**

The impact of Love INC is reaching well beyond the walls of the churches. "What we see is that the community is taking notice and we see communities seeking us out, - the city and the county and the state are all realizing that charity in itself doesn't work." Pastor Brenn Angelos of Revolution 22 Church is part of the Boise, Iowa, Love INC network. Ange-Ios and his church members often help home owners with building projects they can't afford on their own. "It's not just 'Here, serve someone. Here's some money, go away,' but it's, - we're going to enter relationally and show Christ through not just tangible things but also through bringing the spirit of God to those in need," Angelos said.

This Love INC strategy is an effective model and method for mobilizing church congregations to live out two of the Bible's greatest commands: to love God and to love their neighbor.
